HHello neighbors,

My name is Dr. Beth Trehu, and I am the new Health Officer for the towns of Mount Vernon and Vienna. My husband and I have had a camp on Flying Pond in Mount Vernon since 2010 and moved here full time in 2018. We now live in Vienna. I plan to contribute to the town newsletters on a regular basis. This month I will describe the role of Local Health Officer, tell you a little about my background, and provide the latest guidance from Maine CDC on vaccines for this year's respiratory virus season.

Local Health Officer

Every town in Maine is required by law to have a Local Health Officer (LHO). The LHO program is run by the Maine Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (MCDC) and forms a network across the state with the goal of improving and caring for the health of local communities. LHOs report to their Selectboards and often collaborate with the Selectboards, Code Enforcement Officers, and other town officials.

The LHO network can also respond in a rapid and coordinated manner in the case of a public health emergency. The MCDC provides on-going training for LHOs in issues that may be of importance to their communities, and I will share information when relevant. Maine law requires LHOs to report diseases, conditions, or public health threats believed to be of public health importance. A "public health threat" means any condition or behavior that can reasonably be expected to place others at significant risk of exposure to infection with a communicable disease.

Some of the primary responsibilities of the LHO are:

- 1. Notify MCDC regarding cases of communicable disease, particularly during declared health emergencies
- 2. Respond to complaints made by members of the public concerning conditions posing a potential public health threat
- 3. Order the suppression and removal of nuisances and conditions suspected of posing or found to pose a public health threat
- 4. Act as a resource for connecting residents with the public health services and resources provided by the Maine CDC
- 5. Enforce certain public health safety laws

My background

I am a recently retired physician and was board certified in Internal Medicine, Hematology (blood diseases), and Oncology (cancer). I was on the faculty of Tufts University School of Medicine, practiced in a Community Cancer Center, and spent the last 22 years of my career designing and conducting clinical trials of new cancer drugs in biotech companies. Before taking on the role of LHO, I completed an on-line training course required by MCDC.

Maine CDC 2025 Recommended Vaccines to Protect You Against Respiratory Viruses

There are three recommended vaccines to keep you as healthy as possible during the high season for respiratory viruses. Influenza

Everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine every season, ideally in September or October. Influenza vaccines may be co-administered with other vaccines

☑ Age 6 months–8 years who have received fewer than 2 influenza vaccine doses, or whose influenza vaccination history is unknown: 2 doses, separated by at least 4 weeks.

☑ Age 6 months–8 years who have received at least 2 influenza vaccine doses: 1 dose.

△ Age 9 years or older, including 65+ years: 1 dose.

RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus)

☑ Infants born October 1st through March 31st) should get an infant RSV antibody within one week after birth – ideally during the birth hospitalization.

☑ Throughout March, any eligible infant or young child who has not yet received a
recommended dose should receive an infant RSV monoclonal antibody at the
earliest opportunity.

☑ Infants born April through September and young children who are at increased risk for severe RSV disease and entering their second RSV season, the optimal timing for infant RSV antibody administration is shortly before the RSV season begins (e.g.,October or November).

☑ Adults 75 or older years and adults 50 years old and older that have an increased risk of severe RSV disease: a single lifetime dose

 \boxtimes Pregnant women to get a single dose of RSV during weeks 32-36 of pregnancy during September through January

COVID-19

All eligible individuals should continue to receive routine COVID-19 vaccination as

follows. COVID-19 vaccines may be co-administered with other vaccines.

☑ All young children ages 6–23 months should get vaccinated against COVID-19.

☑ Certain children ages 2–18 years should get vaccinated with a single dose of age-appropriate 2025–2026 COVID-19 vaccine, regardless of vaccination status, if they:

o are at high risk of severe COVID-19,

o are residents of long-term care facilities or other congregate settings,

o have never been vaccinated, or

o have household contacts at high risk for severe COVID-19.

□ Children not in one of the groups above, whose parent or guardian desires their protection from COVID-19, also should be offered a single dose of the updated vaccine.

△ Adults 19-64 years should receive 1 dose of age appropriate 2025-2026 COVID-19 Vaccine

☑ Adults 65+ years should receive 2 doses of age appropriate 2025-2026

COVID-19 vaccine 6 months apart (minimum interval 2 months)

☑ Pregnant, recently pregnant, or lactating women should receive 1 dose of age

appropriate COVID-19 2025-2026 vaccine

*Moderately or severely immunocompromised please discuss with your medical provider.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE VIENNA PLANNING BOARD HELD AUGUST 27, 2025

- At 6:30 PM regular members Waine Whittier, Creston Gaither, Alan Williams, Ed Lawless and alternate member Steve Trehu met with contractor Jim Meader on the Harpine lot on Hunt Drive and on Flying Pond, shown on tax map 10 as lot 42-F, to consider the Harpines' proposal to rebuild an existing cabin and reconfigure its roof and to move it farther away from the pond.
- At 7:10 PM said members convened the Board's regular meeting at the Town House; Steve was made a voting member in Tim Bickford's absence.

Minutes of the July 23 meeting were read and accepted.

Regarding the revised draft of the proposed Commercial Solar Energy Ordinance, MMA advised Waine that they cannot do a full review of the ordinance. Waine will ask them if we can legally substitute the title "solar officer" for "code enforcement officer" and whether our definition of "commercial" is sufficient. If we get answers to these questions Waine will advise the selectmen that the Planning Board does not think we need a lawyer to review the ordinance. If we don't get answers we may need a legal review.

It was agreed that we will need a public hearing for ordinance enactment. The Board may want to make its October meeting a public hearing.

Michael Church appeared at 7:40 seeking a permit for his house. He has a site evaluation and was advised that he will need a SSWD permit from the plumbing inspector.

The Harpines' proposal was discussed. Shoreland Zoning Ordinance (SZO) Sect. 12.C.3 regarding relocation of structures was briefly reviewed; it appears to allow the relocation proposed. As no sleeping area is proposed for the cabin, plumbing is not an issue. Creston will send an email to Jim Meader regarding the required application, and will mention the need for photos and a site sketch and that SZO Sect. 12.C.1 says the cabin would have to be moved to at least 25 feet from the pond for any expansion of the footprint, and that no approval is granted at this point.

The meeting adjourned at 8:05 PM.
